BECOMING A CHILD CARE PROFESSIONAL. (Caring for Children, Tape 12.) Produced by Walter (Chip) Donohue and Jim Shaw, UW-Extension. Madison, WI: UW Board of Regents, 1991. VHS, 30 min.

What it takes to become a child care professional and what it means to be one, ways to continue your education and development, community resources, networking, advocacy, the business of child care, and advice to new child care professionals.

BECOMING A TEACHER OF YOUNG CHILDREN. (Caring for Children, Tape 1.) Produced by Walter (Chip) Donohue and Jim Shaw, UW Extension. Madison, WI: University of Wisconsin Board of Regents, 1991. VHS, 30 min.

Looks at the characteristics and skills of a successful child care teacher or family child care provider. Shows what high quality child care looks like.

BUILDING QUALITY CHILD CARE: RELATIONSHIPS. Washington, DC: NAEYC, 1991. VHS, 15 min.

Focuses on the relationship between caregiver and child, the essential ingredient of quality child care. Explains the caregiver's responsibility to understand and adapt to children's different temperaments and styles. Also discusses the importance of caregivers' relationships with parents.

CAREER ENCOUNTERS: EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION. Washington, DC: NAEYC, 1995. VHS, 29 min.

Introduces us to careers in the field of early childhood education by taking us to visit early childhood professionals working with children birth to eight in a variety of settings.

CELEBRATING EARLY CHILDHOOD TEACHERS. Washington, DC: NAEYC, 1986. VHS, 20 min.

This tape is useful for raising people's awareness of the value of the early childhood profession, among both the general public and child care professionals themselves. It discusses the importance of good teachers, with comments by key people in the child care field.

CHILD CARE CAREERS: HELP DEFINE THE FUTURE. Madison, WI: Knupp & Watson, Inc., 2000. VHS, 12 min.

Upbeat recruitment video about career opportunities for a child care worker in Wisconsin.

CURRICULUM: THE ROLE OF THE TEACHER. Washington, DC: NAEYC, 1989. VHS, 28 min.

Illustrates the important role of the teacher in helping children learn through child-initiated activity in a developmentally appropriate, play-oriented environment.

THE FULL COST OF QUALITY IN EARLY CHILDHOOD PROGRAMS: WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW, WHAT YOU CAN DO. By Barbara Willer. Washington, DC: NAEYC, 1992. VHS, 17 min.

Designed to educate parents, community leaders, and others about NAEYC's Full Cost of Quality in Early Childhood Campaign. Describes the demand and supply of early childhood care and education, and outlines strategies for working to improve the quality of the system and adequately compensate child care providers.

GOAL SETTING FOR EARLY CHILDHOOD: A PARTNERSHIP IN ACTION. Lubbock, TX: Creative Educational Video, 1989. VHS, 22 min. + study guide.

Describes characteristics of children with healthy self-images, establishes steps in caregivers' goal setting, and explores the application of goal setting to a child care program. Illustrates how setting and achieving appropriate goals enhances self-esteem.

MEN: CARING FOR YOUNG CHILDREN. Washington, DC: NAEYC, 1993. VHS, 31 min.

Men from a wide variety of early childhood settings describe why they have chosen careers working with young children.

MENTORING TO IMPROVE SCHOOLS: SUCCESSFUL MENTORING. Alexandria, VA: ASCD, 1999. 2 VHS tapes, 65 min. total + 175-page facilitator's guide.

These programs focus primarily on the refinement or development of a powerful induction program and effective mentoring practices for beginning teachers and, to a lesser extent, beginning administrators.

NEW OPTIONS: THE REMODELING OF CDA. Washington, DC: Council for Early Childhood Professional Recognition, 1992. VHS, 14 min.

Brief summary of the Child Development Associate training assessment and credentialing process.

THE NEW TEACHER: MEETING THE CHALLENGES. Port Chester, NY: National Professional Resources, 2000. VHS, 30 min.

Teaching is much more difficult work than ever before. Increased standards and diverse learning needs are just two issues teachers face in their jobs. This video identifies practical ways to meet the challenges that new teachers, administrators, staff developers, and teacher educators face.

NEW VOICES, NEW LEADERS: THE LEADERSHIP EMPOWERMENT ACTION PROJECT. Seattle, WA: Harvest Resources, 2003. VHS, 16 min. + viewer's guide.

Tells the story of the Leadership Empowerment Action Project (LEAP), developed to help address staff turnover and expand the voices of leadership in the early childhood education field. LEAP classes center on the belief that those who actually do the direct work of early care and education should be providing leadership in shaping the solutions to the child care crisis in America.

OPENING DOORS: AN INTRODUCTION TO PEER COACHING. Alexandria, VA: ASCD, 1989. 2 VHS, videocassettes, 65 min. total + facilitator's manual.

Defines peer coaching, looks at potential benefits, introduces the various forms coaching can take, and discusses the environmental variables which need to be considered for successful implementation of a peer coaching program. Supplemental tape shows edited pre-conferences and post-conferences that illustrate the three major types of coaching.

THE REGISTRY: COUNTING ALL THAT YOU DO. Madison, WI: The Registry, 2001. VHS, 10 min.

Explains the work of The Registry, Wisconsin's recognition system for the childhood care and education profession, which tracks the continuing education of members, their professional contributions, and their years in the field.

SEEDS OF CHANGE: LEADERSHIP AND STAFF DEVELOPMENT. (The Early Childhood Program: A Place To Learn And Grow, Tape 8.) Washington, DC: NAEYC, 1996. VHS, 34 min.

This video explores ways to encourage professional development of teachers and caregivers while implementing developmentally appropriate practices in programs serving children ages three through eight. It shows how teachers advocate for change in practices and how they analyze and implement best practices in individual schools. And it shows what kids can do when freed up to demonstrate their own capabilities.

SIDE BY SIDE: MENTORING TEACHERS FOR A REFLECTIVE PRACTICE. By Margie Carter. Seattle, WA: Harvest Resources, 2004. VHS or DVD, 26 min. + guide.

Follows two child care programs as they design a mentoring program to guide their teachers in becoming better observers and curriculum developers by drawing on the children's interests and ideas. Presents principles to help in mentoring teachers to develop an engaging, meaningful, and reflective teaching practice.

SKILLS FOR CHILD CARE WORKERS. Bloomington, IL: Meridian Education Corp, 2000. VHS, 17 min. + guide.

Reviews the primary characteristics of the successful child care teacher/worker and the skills necessary to do the job well.

TEACH: TEACHER EDUCATION AND COMPENSATION HELPS, EARLY CHILDHOOD. Chapel Hill, NC: Child Care Services Association, 2001?. VHS, 19 min.

Describes the TEACH Early Childhood program, which provides educational opportunities for child care workers in North Carolina, Wisconsin, and other states.

TEACHERS IN TRANSITIONS: ROOM TO GROW. Washington, DC: NAEYC, 1994. VHS, 23 min.

Primary teachers and administrators discuss their individual experiences in trying to implement developmentally appropriate practice.

USING THE NEW CDA OBSERVATION INSTRUMENT. Washington, DC: Council for Early Childhood Professional Recognition, 1993. VHS, 25 min.

Instructions for Child Development Associate (CDA) advisors on how to use the new CDA observation instrument. Includes examples for observation practice.

WHAT MATTERS: THE MUSIC AND TEACHING OF BOB BLUE. Portland, ME: Bob Blue Video, 1998. VHS, 45 min.

Bob Blue is a talented songwriter who also taught elementary school for over 20 years. Respect for children's feelings and a passion for social justice are central to his songs. This documentary explores how he used music in his classroom to teach specific curriculum lessons while also helping to build community. Includes footage from a 1997 concert where musicians from all over the country came together to showcase his songs.

PERSONAL GROWTH AND WELLNESS

AVOIDING CHILD CARE BURN-OUT. Lubbock, TX: Creative Educational Video, 1996. VHS, 34 min. + study guide.

An overview of what child care burnout is, how you can recognize it, what causes it, and what you can do about it.

CARING FOR THE CAREGIVER. Winnipeg, Manitoba: Family Day Care Association of Manitoba, 1993. VHS, 19 min. + guide.

The first step in providing quality care for children is caring for ourselves. In this tape, infant and toddler caregivers share their thoughts on the rewards and challenges of caregiving and tell what they do to alleviate stress and care for themselves.

DISCIPLINE, STRESS, AND THE HUMAN ENVIRONMENT. Lubbock, TX: Creative Educational Video, 1994. VHS, 30 min. + study guide.

Illustrates ways in which stress felt by caregivers can cause children to behave badly and how bringing stress into the child care environment affects the whole system because "we see what we feel". We learn what causes stress, who is at risk, positive and negative effects of stress and ways to handle work stress.

FISH! : CATCH THE ENERGY, RELEASE THE POTENTIAL! Burnsville, MN: ChartHouse International Learning Corporation, 1998. VHS, 17 min. + facilitator's guide + playbook.

Shows employees how to generate the energy needed for a high morale work environment. Highlights four main concepts: play, make their day, be there, and choose your attitude. Also portrays the playful atmosphere necessary for creativity to flourish. **Due to the producer's licensing restrictions, CCIC can loan this tape to child day care centers only and not on interlibrary loan.**

MANAGING MULTIPLE ROLES. Lubbock, TX: Creative Educational Video, 1993. VHS, 23 min. + study guide.

Discusses the difficulties of managing multiple roles, including role overload and stress. Outlines practical methods for reducing stress through good management skills.

SHORT CIRCUITING STRESS: CHANGING THE WAY YOU THINK ABOUT STRESS. By James E. Porter. Norwalk, CT: Audio Vision, 1994. VHS, 18 min. + leader's guide.

Demonstrates how you can control your reaction to stress by controlling what you think about stressful events. Gives five good strategies for short-circuiting stress.

WEIGHT: MAINTAINING A HEALTHY BALANCE. Evanston, IL: Altschul Group Corporation, 1996. VHS, 12 min.

Simple guidelines to help maintain a healthy weight and lifestyle for you and your family. Covers food choices, cooking methods, exercise.

HUMOR

GONE THROUGH ANY CHANGES LATELY? Denver, CO: Western Media Products, 1999. VHS, 4 min.

This fun 4-minute video uses the slinky to help people understand and deal with change in a positive way. Perfect for workshops, team meetings, or training sessions on any topic involving change.

HOW SERIOUS IS THIS? By Loretta LaRoche. Boston: WGBH Educational Foundation, 1997. VHS, 76 min.

Through humor, Loretta LaRoche puts life in perspective and provides simple rules to live by. She examines the irrational and exaggerated patterns of thinking that drive us all nuts. Loretta also shows viewers some practical exercises, from how to breathe to exaggeration therapy, a technique for examining life's worries and seeing how quickly they can be moved from the sublime to the ridiculous.

HUMOR YOUR STRESS. By Loretta LaRoche. Boston: WGBH Video, 1996. VHS, 60 min.

Loretta LaRoche uses humor to help viewers get a handle on their stress by putting their lives back in perspective.

THE JOY OF STRESS. By Loretta LaRoche. Boston: WGBH Educational Foundation, 1995. VHS, 47 min.

This program explores the concept of stress and how it affects your body, mind, and spirit. It shows how to use humor to break the negative and irrational thought patterns that cause stress, and through humor strengthen your immune system and prevent "Hardening of the Attitude."

LAUGH & LEARN: EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT WORKSHOP. By Allen Mallory. Tuscaloosa, AL: Allen Mallory, 1992. VHS, 105 min.

Dr. Mallory presents practical child development principles such as discipline, self-concept, staff relations, parents, curriculum areas and motivation delivered in both a humorous and serious manner.

LAUGH & LEARN II. By Allen Mallory. Tuscaloosa, AL: Allen Mallory, 1996. VHS, 2 hrs.

A humorous look at child care from Allen Mallory, a college teacher and stand-up comic who's been a day care aide, teacher, center director and owner and whose comedy workshops have made him one of the most in-demand speakers in our field.
