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The National Coalition for Core Arts Standards has released the conceptual framework for the areas of dance, music, theatre, visual arts, and media arts. The writing teams have been utilizing the "Understanding by Design" (UbD) approach to curriculum development and have worked to link to artistic processes in grades preK-8. 

Description - Using Google docs and the WSMA performance based rubric, we have created a Google form so students can submit a pre/post evaluation of Large Group festival performances.

Title - Authentic Art Class

Description-Let's take a look at studio based art instruction. This type of art room allows students the chance to enter the art making process from where they are and what
