Why Engage in Virtual Exchange?

Virtual exchange creates cross-cultural experiences that build real-world job skills – including communication, collaboration, empathy, language, and problem-solving. Participants gain self-awareness, selfconfidence, and the start of a global network of peers. It's also cost-effective, scalable, and uniquely capable of reaching diverse populations that might otherwise not have global experiences.











Frequently Asked Questions

- How do participants communicate? In real-time over Zoom or Skype during classroom meetings or team-based breakouts, asynchronously through message boards and WhatsApp groups, or a combination of the two (which we see often).
- How long are programs? Anywhere from twoeight weeks, sometimes up to 12 weeks, if they're following a semester or course calendar.
- What is the time commitment of participants? Eight-30 hours over the course of the exchange, which boils down to a few hours a week and could look like participants meeting for group program activities led by facilitators, attending calls to work on projects or working offline on contributions, messaging one another, or attending a culminating celebration.
- Where do teachers come in? Virtual exchange enables educators to become facilitators of learning beyond their expertise, which we know is critical for preparing young people to thrive. Teachers and other leaders who work with young people can join existing virtual exchange programs, where they receive curriculum and training to augment what they're already doing in the classroom.

How to Get Involved in Virtual Exchange

Primary school teachers, district superintendents, and more can help young people broaden their skills and horizons through virtual exchange.

- Engage with existing virtual exchange programs that support language learning, social science and STEM exploration, art and storytelling creation, and so much more through two pathways:
 - Join a program. Gain access to content, partnership networks, technology, facilitation training, and other forms of guidance and support. These programs can be seamlessly incorporated into classroom curriculum and are designed to meet standardized learning goals.
 - Mobilize youth participation. Share open enrollment opportunities with young people who can participate on their own time, often from home.
- Train for virtual exchange. Participate in our landmark training, the Virtual Exchange Academy, or one of the Stevens Initiative-vetted trainings we will be sharing about soon.
