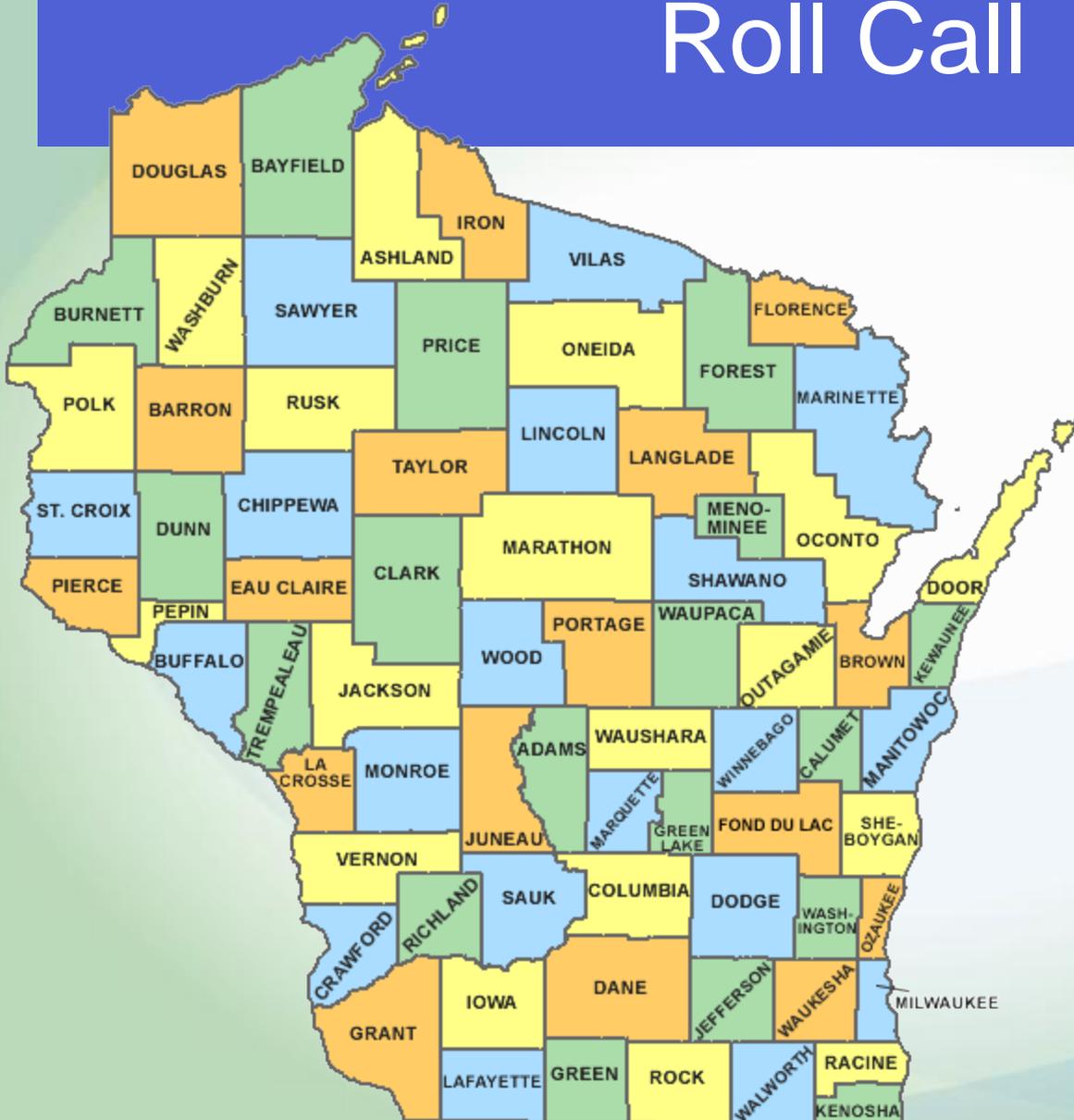

# Review of Data Collection Activities

2010-11

- On-line YRBS administration in 69 high schools in 19 districts
- Suspensions and expulsions through March 30<sup>th</sup>, submitted via separate reporting form
- Baseline “Index of Student Behavior and School Environment” (School Safety Score) established using a weighted formula
- 56 high schools selected for continued participation in project



# Review of Data Collection Activities (continued)

2011-12

- OYRBS administration and discipline data collection process repeated
- “Score Cards” with comparison to baseline data provided prior to Summer Institute
- Recalculation using same baseline year “weighting factor” resulted in creation of updated Score Cards and corrected web postings



# Formula for Score Calculations

- Average of students YRBS responses on 9 indicators + school's suspensions and expulsions per 1000 students x "multiplier"
- Multiplier determined by disciplinary incident averages in year 1 of project
- Weighting factor compresses range of scores and makes the two factors more equitable



# 2012 Data Analysis

- Initial comparisons (using a new weighting factor) reflected less score improvement than expected
- Recalculation using original weighting factor reflected that 36 of 55 high schools improved their scores (65%) over their baseline scores from 2010-11



# 2012 Data Analysis (continued)

- Using project baseline year multiplier/weighting factor allows for a more accurate comparison of data
- Project staff can facilitate significant impact on “scores” through disciplinary policy shifts and student engagement practices
- Schools with lower (that’s good) baseline year scores, or lower enrollments, have less ability to improve scores and/or can be negatively effected by slight changes



# Data Collection for 2012-13

- Need to complete 2011-12 ISES reporting of “suspensions for endangering behavior” to allow for final GPRA indicator comparison to 2010-11
- OYRBS Survey to be completed between February and April, 2013
- Total out-of-school suspensions and expulsions through March 30, 2013 to be submitted by May 1, 2013

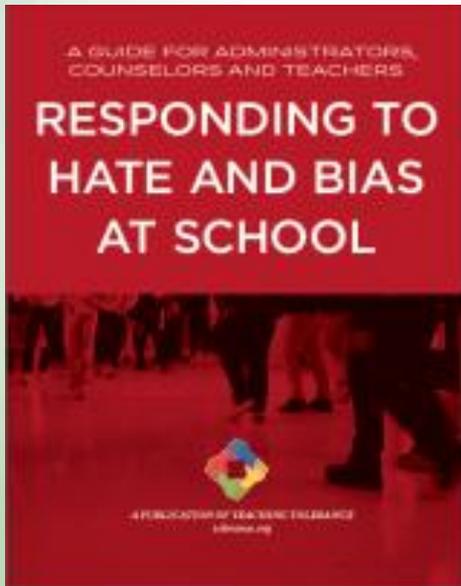
