The Wisconsin School Health Services Report is designed to collect annual school nursing and health services data from each school district in order to develop a cumulative statewide picture of school health services. This is a voluntary report; however, we are hoping that all district school nurses and private school nurses will want to participate! Only one person from each district should total the 2015-16 data for individual schools in the district and report it as an aggregated total to the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction by June 20, 2016. Private or charter schools are welcome to participate if their data is not part of an aggregated district.

This year, the data collection will add others who provide care and their disposition of students. Wisconsin's aggregated data will be collectively combined to the national data. You will submit the data by June 20, 2016, by going to the DPI data collection site. You can visit the DPI data information webpage at <http://dpi.wi.gov/sspw/pupil-services/school-nurse/data> to see additional information. You can also visit the NASN Step Up Be Counted website at <http://www.nasn.org/Research/StepUpBeCounted>.

Collecting data as part of this national initiative is important. The Wisconsin Association of School Nurses (WASN) is supporting this initiative, and many of the WASN members have been involved with the development of the tool, both nationally and here in Wisconsin. The report is divided into three sections: health personnel, chronic conditions, and health office visit dispositions by those giving care.

Read each question carefully, as well as its definition. Also, note that the administering of medications, (daily, prn, and nursing procedures) is a face-to-face time with students and therefore should have a disposition (which would normally be to return to the classroom). Freddi Adelson, DPI School Nurse Consultant and member of the Healthy Learner Collaborative of Wisconsin reports the following great strides in school nursing practice:

Project Name:

Madison Metropolitan School District (MMSD) School Health Care Link Partnership Project

Project Description:

The focus of the project is MMSD elementary school students with asthma who receive care at UW Health pediatric primary care clinics in Madison, WI. Both the school district and individual school nurse have signed written agreements for participation. Parents who choose to be part of the project provide written authorization allowing access to their child's electronic medical record (EMR). After completing HIPAA and Care Link training, school nurses are given read only access to the student's EMR and are able to communicate directly with the student's care provider using direct secure messaging. School nurses are supported by coaches who troubleshoot any technical problems and help them integrate the EMR access into their daily workflow. Currently, a pilot is underway in 3 schools partnering with 2 UW pediatric clinics. The project will expand to all MMSD elementary schools at the start of the 2016-17 school year.

Project History:

Several years ago, the Healthy Learner Collaborative of Wisconsin, a group of nurses from clinical, hospital and school settings, began to focus on the desirability and feasibility of school nurse access to the EMR. Our goals were to promote the school nurse as an integral member of the student health care team and improve communication between the school nurse and the student's health care provider.

We learned of the Nemours (DE) Student Health Collaboration program and followed up with conference calls with Claudia Kane, Program Manager of the Student Health Collaboration at Nemours and Linda Wolfe, Delaware State School Nurse Consultant. At the same time that we began to develop a plan to approach local health care organizations about their interest in implementing a similar project in Madison, an opportunity to partner with a local health care organization and allergy providers arose. When Rob Lemanske, MD, became president of the American Academy of Allergy, Asthma and Immunology in Feb, 2015, he began to articulate his presidential initiative to improve asthma management in schools. He was particularly interested in making sure that all students with asthma had asthma action plans available to their school nurses.

Dr. Lemanske's colleague, Sujani Kakumanu, MD, a UW Madison School of Medicine and Public Health allergist, submitted and obtained a grant from the Office of the National Coordinator, US Department of Health and Human Services to fund the development of technology infrastructure to support the School Health Care Link Partnership. The project goals are to improve the care for students with asthma and to increase the number of asthma action plans in schools. The strategies to achieve these goals are to provide school nurses with access to the EMR and to streamline communication with the provider. This project built on the successes of the Nemours Student Health Collaboration which generously answered many questions and shared form templates and other written materials with our group.
