Data Matters!



- 1. Intervene before problems get big**
- 2. Prior-year data can help anticipate needs**
- 3. Data helps target effective interventions**
- 4. Investigate sub-population strengths, needs, and solutions**

Data to Improve System

1. Impacts of schedules, start times, half-days, and holidays
2. Trends: sibling absences, seasons, certain classrooms or courses, transitions, grades, common barriers
3. Perceptions, negative school experiences, lack of engagement
4. Types and impacts of interventions
5. Finding and solving root causes



Consider Your Referral Data

When students are referred for habitual truancy to a court or YJ/CPS:

- *Does their attendance improve?*
- *Does their sense of school belonging and engagement improve?*
- *Do they ultimately graduate at a higher rate than those students who have struggles with attendance but are not referred?*
- *Do we know the type of students for whom referrals are effective? Or which groups of students have improved outcomes?*
