1. Careers and Communications: A Stepping Stone for ACP

Many districts are just beginning their ACP implementation. In the School District of New Berlin, one of the early steps in our ACP implementation was the creation of the Grade 7 Careers and Communications (C2) course during the 2013-14 school year. The C2 course provides a solid foundation for Academic and Career Planning. This course has allowed us to build out a scope and sequence to support students transitioning from elementary to middle school. It was a key implementation lever in ensuring that all students in grades 6-12 had access to Academic and Career Planning services by 2017-18. This session will review the learning objectives, scope and sequence, and resources leveraged in the class. Specific results gathered through assessments, disposition development, and student reflections will also be discussed. New Berlin SD

5. Teaching Financial Literacy Through Blended Learning Everfi

On the pathway to college and career readiness, it is critically important that students develop the skills necessary to be financially responsible. During this session, we will discuss strategies for integrating three web-based, financial literacy resources at the elementary school, middle school, and high school level. At all levels, the EverFi Platform provides teachers and students with engaging, online resources that uses video, animations, and interactive activities and games to bring complex financial concepts to life at no cost. Additionally, EverFi tracks individual student progress and knowledge gain and provides students who successfully complete the program with certification in financial literacy. For the high school program in particular, these certificates can be a powerful tool for job, college and internship applications. During this session, we will also share specific examples of how school districts across Wisconsin and the country are implementing these programs to make a huge impact on their students. 19. Redefining Ready in WI - Creating Relevance with E4E and ACP

America's schools have a profound responsibility to ensure that our nation's 14 million high school students are college ready, career ready and life ready. Standardized test scores – traditionally used as the primary readiness indicator – do not always provide an accurate representation of our students' potential. According to US News and World Report, out of 2.1 million test takers, only 38 percent of the 2016 graduating class across the United States met three of the four college readiness benchmarks on the ACT exam. Like the global economy, today's students are driven by ideas and innovations. Students are being asked to learn differently than they have in the past.

College and career readiness indicators must also reflect the desired changes in the 21st century educational landscape. Educators are charged with identifying and developing the unique talents of each of our students. We can't prepare them, nor should we measure their progress, in exactly the same way. We are committed to designing programming to allow all students the opportunity to identify and apply their unique knowledge, skills and abilities throughout their K12 education. Consequently, students should be allowed to demonstrate readiness in a variety of ways. This session is best attended by building and district leaders and teams who would like to advance an expanded view of College and Career Readiness in their district along with research based metrics to demonstrate progress on a broader scale.
