


In light of COVID-19, how much of your programming at each grade level got accomplished in 2019-20?



Engaging Special Populations in ACP Programming

Special populations as defined by Perkins V:

- Individuals with disabilities
- Individuals from economically disadvantaged families
- Individuals preparing for nontraditional occupational field
- English learners
- Homeless individuals
- Youth who are in, or have aged out of, foster care
- Single parents, including pregnant women
- Youth with a parent who is in active duty with armed forces

COVID-19 Accommodations

What's the same:

Structure of the day

Content

What's different:

No visitors

Minimize movement in the building/classroom and provide social distancing

Minimize the use of paper/surface touching

Must offer Virtual Learning instruction



COVID-19 ACP Programming

Convert all lessons to accommodate virtual instruction (using Google Slides, Google Meets, Screencastify)

Why Academic Career Plans (ACPs)?



• ACPs are Academic Career Plans that all students grades 6-12 have as <u>individual</u> students, required by the state.

• The MISSION of ACPs is to empower ALL students to *actively participate* in future planning through education and training to careers.

• Students ENGAGE in activities meant to help them learn about themselves, career and college possibilities, and planning steps for their future path.

Summative Measure: Senior Portfolio / Exit Interview

Introduction of Student

- Resume
- Letter of Recommendation
- Personal Essay/Experience Paper
- Career Experience Paper or Career Plan
- Final Reflection Paper
- Various School Records (Optional)

Student Achievements

- One work sample from the following core areas: Math, English, Science, Social Studies
- One work sample from two different curricular areas
- Four work samples from any curricular areas
- Two samples from extra-curricular areas or activities outside of school


