Assessment

New:

2022-23 Statewide Assessment Data

Assessment results are now available in WISEdash for Districts. As you may know, this release involves summarizing data from individual student tests into various reports at the school, district, and state levels. These reports also include summaries for various student demographic groups, such as English learners or students with disabilities.

DPI received the results from the assessment vendors and loaded them into WISEdash for Districts in the summer (in late July). DPI staff then performed quality assurance checks and data validation on these summary data before this release. This past year, students in grades 9 and 10 took the PreACT Secure assessment for the first time. Reporting on this new assessment required the creation of a new dashboard, which consumed additional development and quality assurance time. DPI will publicly release the statewide assessment results in the fall. Data security and student privacy requirements, as outlined in the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) and state law, must be maintained when districts are sharing results publicly. Districts are responsible for ensuring that parents/guardians are provided reports in a language they can understand and in a format that is accessible to them. Reporting resources for parents/guardians are available on each assessment's data and results webpage.

Report Card Narrative Statement Collection in August

Each fall, report cards are created for Wisconsin districts and schools. DPI is again providing the option to write brief narrative statements that will appear on the front page of district and school report cards. Districts may choose to write separate statements for the district report card (if applicable) and each



school; may use the same statement across all report cards for the district and schools; or may opt out of submitting a statement. This optional statement can be used to broadly discuss the focus of the district and/or school, initiatives, outstanding characteristics, culture, student engagement, or other information you would like to publicly highlight. The purpose of this statement is to highlight information that may not be otherwise communicated in the measures on the report card.



OEA plans to send out the optional report card narrative statement collection survey to DACs within the next week. DACs will receive an email with the link to submit a narrative for your district and schools. Please plan to coordinate the narrative submission process with your District Administrator and work with district and school leadership teams to compose and submit these statements. As with prior years, this statement will be a maximum of 400 characters (including spaces), should only include characters found on a standard keyboard, and you can have unique statements for the district report card (if applicable) and any school report cards. We will update DACs in the next DAC Digest regarding the collection timeline. If you would like an advance start on preparing your statement(s), you can review last year's submissions on the <u>public report card app</u>.

Forward Exam

Alignment with new ELA and Mathematics Standards

The spring 2024 Forward Exam for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics at grades 3-8 will be aligned to the new Wisconsin Standards for ELA (adopted in 2020) and Mathematics (adopted in 2021). Updated Forward Exam Practice Tests will be available in December on the <u>Forward Exam Practice Tests</u> webpage to help students prepare. More information about the newly aligned assessments will be communicated over the next several months.

Changes to the Forward ELA Exam Design

The changes to the Wisconsin Standards for ELA (adopted in 2020) provided the opportunity to make changes to the test design beginning with the 2023-24 administration. These changes include:

- There will only be three test sessions instead of four. The test sessions will be:
 - o Session 1 Reading Comprehension
 - o Session 2 Language Arts/Writing
 - o Session 3 Language Arts/Writing



- The listening session has been removed from the Forward Exam.
- The Text Dependent Analysis has been removed and replaced with new writing tasks. In test sessions 2 and 3, students will be asked to provide a one-paragraph writing sample in response to a prompt, in addition to answering language arts and writing questions.

Descriptions of the two new writing tasks are provided below.

- 1. Students will be asked to write a one-paragraph response to a writing prompt in a specific mode (e.g., narrative, opinion, argumentative, informative) based on grade-level standards.
- 2. Students will be asked to read a short passage and write a one-paragraph response to a related writing prompt in a specific mode (e.g., narrative, opinion, argumentative, informative) based on grade-level standards. The associated passage should be used by the student to support their writing or as mentor text depending on the prompt.

Recently Signed Reading Legislation

<u>Wisconsin Act 20</u> directs the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) to administer a single statewide Reading Readiness assessment beginning in the 2024-25 school year. This assessment will replace the Reading Readiness assessment that is currently selected and administered by each Wisconsin LEA.

For the upcoming 2023-24 school year, the screening requirements remain unchanged from the previous school year. DPI is in the process of creating a webpage where all updates and information about the process to implement Act 20 will be housed. Look for this webpage on the DPI website in a few weeks.

Reimbursement

On June 20, DPI electronically reimbursed districts for their Reading Readiness expenses for the 2022-23 school year. More information about these reimbursements can be found at the STAR AIDS Register; search under "Assessments of Reading Readiness Public".
