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



As the demand for wheat products grew, cattle grazing was reduced, and millions more acres were plowed and planted. . . . Drought [began] in 1930. . . . Winds whipped across the plains, raising billowing clouds of dust. The sky could darken for days. . . . In some places, the dust drifted like snow, covering farm buildings and houses. Nineteen states in the heartland of the United States became a vast dust bowl. With no chance of making a living, farm families abandoned their homes and land, fleeing westward to become migrant laborers.



#### **SOCIAL STUDIES ITEMS—SESSION 2**

1. William Clark and Meriwether Lewis led an expedition for President Thomas Jefferson after the United States purchased land west of the Mississippi River. Lewis and Clark did not travel alone, however. They needed help from people who knew the land and the people they would encounter. Two people, in particular, were very important to the success of the expedition. York, an enslaved man, and Sacagawea, a Shoshone woman, were part of the expedition. Jefferson wanted to know more about the West. The information in the box is an adapted version of a journal entry written by William Clark in 1804.

The prairies come within a short distance of the river on each side. The prairies contain plums, raspberries, large amounts of wild apples, and a number of deer. We camped on an island situated on the south side of the river opposite some larger than normal hills. The hills were about 160 or 180 feet high.
