

Writing a Quality SLO

STUDENT POPULATION

High-quality SLOs start with a plan. The SLO plan should provide enough detail to support the peer or evaluator in their review and monitoring of the plan over the course of the interval. This walkthrough uses an example to depict common challenges in the development of the SLO, to provide reflection/coaching prompts, and to demonstrate suggested revision.



Original Example BEFORE:

All the students in grades 9-12 who take SRI, PLAN, EXPLORE, PSAT, WSAS and/or ACT.

REVIEW & ANALYZE the example using:

The <u>Quality Indicators</u>	Self-reflection or coach prompts

How does your knowledge of the learners influence the selection of strategies you will use to promote growth?• Is there a federal identification/notification for the school/district? If so, are what are the benefits and costs of focusing on the identified learner groups in the SLO goal?



Analysis of the BEFORE

- Students should be identified as the result of assessment data analysis, rather than participation in assessment.
- One exception to this is if a student population is specifically identified as part of federal identification/notification or assessment.



AFTER the review and analysis, the original example of Student Population has been rewritten to identify the students who are performing below grade level in the standard, rather than being identified based on participation in an assessment.

The Example AFTER #1:

The SLO population includes all learners, grades 9-12 who are performing below grade level in the identified standard.

The Example AFTER #2:

The SLO population includes all learners, grades 9-12 included in federal identification/notification subgroups.
