ARP-HCY Funding Basics and Updated Federal Guidance

ARP-HCY Basics



- \$800 million in new homeless education funds at the federal level, approximately \$10.1 million of which was allocated to Wisconsin
- Areas of focus include supporting the
 - Identification of children and youth experiencing homelessness
 - School engagement of children and youth experiencing homelessness
 - Provision of wrap-around services to children and youth experiencing homelessness
- Timeline: Funds should be obligated by <u>Sept 30, 2024</u>; in other words, spend, spend!



ARP-HCY Purposes



- Addressing the urgent needs of homeless children and youth, including academic, social, emotional, and mental health
- Increasing capacity at the State Educational Agency (SEA) and Local Educational Agency (LEA) levels by hiring staff, dedicating resources, providing technical assistance, and planning partnerships with community-based organizations (CBOs)
- Connecting students and their families to extended day and extended year learning and enrichment programming
- Supporting historically underserved student groups



Guiding Principles for Using ARP-HCY Funds

- ARP-HCY funding is **supplemental** in nature
 - If a support is already being provided to all or a broad group of (non-homeless) students, or if a need can be met easily through other sources, ARP-HCY funds should not be used
 - Other sources to support McKinney-Vento students include general district; Title I, Part A homeless set-side; and Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds
- ARP-HCY funding usages must align with the purposes and requirements of the McKinney-Vento and American Rescue Plan Acts
- ARP-HCY funding usages must be reasonable and necessary; this may need to be evaluated on a case-by-case basis



Allowable Usages of ARP-HCY Funds

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- ✓ <u>Flexible funds usage</u> ("any expenses necessary to facilitate the identification, enrollment, retention, and educational success of homeless children and youth")
- ✓ Any of the existing <u>16 authorized activities</u> for McKinney-Vento subgrant funding
 - Wraparound services (academic, traumainformed, social-emotional, mental health)
 - Needed supplies (eyeglasses, school supplies, personal care items)
 - Transportation to support school engagement
 - Communication devices and technology needed for school engagement

- Short-term housing as a last resort when needed for school engagement (e.g., a few days in a motel)
- **Prepaid store or debit cards** needed to purchase materials for school engagement
- Awarding contracts to community-based organizations (CBOs)

Updated Federal ARP-HCY Guidance Highlights

Updated <u>ARP-HCY Dear Colleague Letter</u> released by the U.S. Department of Education in September 2024

- Underscores the timeliness of spending ARP-HCY funds given the funding deadline
- Encourages state education departments and school districts to modify administrative processes (e.g., budget amendment and procurement) to expedite the deployment of ARP-HCY funds
- Addresses common allowable uses of funds questions that arose during the first two years of ARP-HCY implementation



Updated Federal ARP-HCY Guidance Highlights

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Examples of allowable use clarifications include

- Providing flexibility regarding length of stay in short-term temporary housing (e.g. a motel)
- Re-emphasizing the allowability of <u>purchasing prepaid store or gas cards</u> to support school engagement
- Giving specific examples of allowable "non-traditional" transportation services in support of school engagement (purchase of vehicles, gas cards for transportation reimbursement, paying for limited car repairs if reasonable and necessary; see the DCL for details)
- Connecting young children to early care and education supports
- Connecting families and students to college preparation supports and providing transportation to enable their attendance to related activities

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
