The units/modules are ideal to support middle school initiatives to teach digital literacy skills.

- An introduction to [Blended Learning Models as defined by the Clayton Christensen Institute](#) and an opportunity to share or hear how others might use the digital content to promote digital literacy skills with middle school students.
- A deeper look at the curriculum that introduces students to the rights and responsibilities of good digital citizenship. The guidelines for becoming a good digital citizen are grouped into three overarching categories: **Connect, Protect, and Respect.**
- Participants will have the opportunity to learn how to navigate efficiently and effectively through digital citizenship course using the Learning Management System (LMS) called "Agilix Buzz."
- Participants will learn the LMS basics of grading, grouping students, and customizing the resource to meet your learner needs for your blended classroom.
- Participants will learn assessment and measurement strategies to gauge student-student digital communication interactions. Additionally, participants will experience how student-instructor interaction is used to coach and model effective 21st century communication skills.
