Library System

Winnefox Library System

Describe demographic, economic, and other facts about your system that influenced the development of this and other system plans.

Winnefox provides support to libraries of widely varying size. While the majority of our libraries are located in communities with populations less than 3,000, we also serve several large and medium size libraries. We are challenged to assist our small libraries in providing services normally found only in large communities while providing our larger libraries with services that they find valuable. In order to provide the greatest good to all, Winnefox provides services that are a benefit to any size library such as printing, delivery, electronic infrastructure support, and electronic resources.

The primary economic influence on this plan is the need to deal with continuing restrictions on funding for the system as well as tight funding for member libraries. Local governments continue to be under levy limits and the support libraries receive from their municipalities and counties has not kept up with increased costs. Payments due to libraries in adjacent counties continue to cause budget pressure for counties and for those libraries which cannot bill neighboring counties.

Though the population of our member counties continues to be predominately native-born and Caucasian, all report increasing numbers of immigrants. The growth of new ethnic populations is causing our membership to examine what they are doing to serve those for whom English is a second language, or for whom reading is not a traditional family activity.

The two most significant factors influencing the development of our service plan are the uncertainties related to the PLSR process and flat funding for most system operations.

In the ordinary course of events Winnefox would engage in a planning process every three years. We have, however, chosen to postpone most formal planning because of the uncertainty about what will emerge from the PLSR process. But that is not to say that we have ceased to look for new ways to serve our libraries, and their users, and are only “treading water”. We continue to look for opportunities to enhance services.

Although we do not have an advisory committee responsible for planning, libraries are involved in planning and evaluation of services and programs. The library directors in each county meet regularly and discussion of system programs is usually on the agenda. Our technology advisory committee, made up of 10 directors, meets bi-monthly and often discusses enhancements to our ILS and other technology-related services. Six directors, one from each county and one elected at-large, are on the committee evaluating a proposed ILS merger with OWLSnet and they report regularly back to the directors in their respective counties.

In 2018 Winnefox, Manitowoc-Calumet, Nicolet, and OWLS systems agreed to cooperatively plan and conduct CE activities beginning in 2019. This plan, named NEWI, is modeled on the successful SEWI collaboration among systems in the southeast part of the state.

Continuing Education/Training Librarian Joy Schwarz will be leading the NEWI program and has already begun planning 2019 programs. It is expected she will continue to work with CE coordinators throughout the state to plan statewide programs.

Assistant Director Mark Arend also presents at workshops and individual training. Our administrative office staff provides support services.

Delivery and Communication

The number of deliveries each library receives has depended on volume; libraries receive delivery either 3, 4, or 5 days per week depending on how many items they were receiving and sending. As a by-product of our talks with OWLSnet we have learned that there is a strong desire by many of our directors to receive delivery 5 days per week. We have made expanding delivery to all libraries a priority for 2019.

- System staff visits new directors individually to provide a one-on-one orientation to system services and often partner new directors with an experienced director who serves as a mentor
- When requested, system staff will visit member library directors and trustees to provide consulting regarding budgeting, building expansion, long range planning, personnel issues or other professional concerns.
- System staff will answer questions by telephone and e-mail as they are received. Staff will consult with outside sources, such as DLTCCL or colleagues around the state, whenever necessary.
- The System Assistant Director will attend each county Library Advisory Committee (LAC) meeting with other staff attending as needed.
- System staff and resource library staff will visit member libraries and provide training in the use of the automated system as needed.
- Continue to contract with the CESA 6 GROW (Grant Resources of Wisconsin) office to provide grant-writing services to member libraries.

- o Materials selection
 - o Weeding
 - o Does "workdays" in libraries—helps with whatever needs doing.
 - o Other purchasing help (example: a library was doing an extensive remodeling and she helped select new furniture and handled the ordering, etc).

Most consulting is by email or phone. A director or trustee will call or email with a question or concern and are generally responded to in the same manner. Occasionally contact will be initiated in person at a meeting or workshop. For some consulting situations the Winnefox director or assistant director will meet personally with a library director or trustee.

The division interprets services to users with special needs as inclusive services. Inclusive library services are holistic, spanning library policies, collections, space, and services. - Continued promotion of electronic information delivery from member libraries as a means to extend traditional library service to those with special needs.

Beginning in September 2018 Winnefox will have a part-time Inclusive Services Coordinator available for member libraries. This person will assist libraries to make services and buildings more welcoming and accessible and improve collections. He will also work with our CE/Training Librarian to plan workshops and other training in these areas.

Communication with member libraries is done through email, monthly or quarterly meetings of directors in each county, special presentations through GoTo Meeting, and presentations at other meetings or workshops.

Winnefox Cooperative Technical Services (WCTS)

Ongoing Activities:

Because WCTS funding is provided on behalf of the libraries directly from Green Lake, Waushara, and Marquette Counties, WCTS primarily serves libraries in those counties. Winnefox member libraries outside of these counties may contract for services from WCTS at cost.

WCTS provides cooperative book selection and processing for member libraries and sponsors several workshops on materials selection each year. WCTS staff provides "work days" consisting of on-site help and consultation for special projects such as weeding.

New or Priority Activities

No new activities are planned at this time.

Administration

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COLLABORATIVE ACTIVITIES

Summary of Activities *Briefly describe collaborative activities with other libraries, public library systems, and other organizations. Exclude services and activities listed in the system's 2019 resource library contract.*

Winnefox has several longstanding collaborative relationships:

Administrative secretarial staff: Winnefox and Oshkosh Public Library jointly staff the administrative office for both organizations. At one time each organization operated separate offices, each with two full-time persons; the combined office has three full-time persons. The current FTE split is Winnefox: 1.8/Oshkosh: 1.2. By operating a combined office both organizations are also saving costs on office supplies and equipment.

Another shared position with Oshkosh Public Library is the Database-Application Developer. This position is three-fourths funded by Winnefox and one-fourth by Oshkosh. This benefits Oshkosh Public Library in that they would not be able to fund a full-time position at this level; a half-time position would likely cost about \$12,000 more than they are currently paying.

FoxNet is a collaborative program between Winnebago County, the Cities of Menasha, Neenah, and Oshkosh, several school districts, and Winnefox to provide a fiber connection between these organizations' facilities. This program costs only minimal maintenance and saves Winnefox and the libraries internet access fees.

Winnefox Cooperative Technical Services (WCTS) is in itself a collaborative program. By centralizing library materials selection, ordering, and processing we are saving 19 libraries both staff time, allowing libraries to operate with less staff or focus staff on direct public service, and direct costs on materials and supplies, by ordering in quantity for better discounts.

For several years Winnefox has provided accounting services to Southwest Library System, saving them a considerable amount of money.

The NEWI CE program is a collaboration with three other systems.

We are focusing our efforts on workforce development and lifelong learning. Although “unemployment” is not the problem it was a few years ago, there is a significant “Underemployment” problem: people who are working but have trouble meeting basic household expenses. According to the United Way’s ALICE report <https://www.unitedwayfoxcities.org/resources/alice/> between 31% & 41% of households in Winnefox counties earn above the federal poverty level, but do not earn enough to afford a basic household budget.

We are therefore focusing our efforts on helping people improve their skills in order to qualify for better-paying jobs.

We are planning several activities under this program.

First, we will be continuing our subscription to the Gale Courses.



