Programming ideas for all ages

- Invite a Wisconsin author to talk about natural resources or state parks.
- Invite staff from your local DNR property to talk about outdoor recreation opportunities on local public lands or to talk about management of local properties.
- Invite local silent sports groups or trail system representatives to share information about local trails, discuss trail etiquette, or provide tips for beginning hikers, bikers, skiers, etc. Encourage the speaker to include state park properties in the discussion.
- Invite a local silent sports shop to provide instruction on bicycle maintenance or to talk about preparation and gear for any kind of outdoor recreation.
- Learn about <u>Geocaching</u>. The <u>Wisconsin Geocaching Association</u> has members all over the state, and many state parks have geocaches you can find.
- Host a community read or encourage your book clubs to read titles about natural resources or public lands. The booklist below includes several titles that discuss racial and socioeconomic equity in outdoor recreation, a topic that could provide rich conversation.

Programming ideas for children & families

- Host storytime programs about outdoor activities like hiking, biking, fishing, and camping.
- Encourage families to get outdoors with a StoryWalk©. Your StoryWalk can be self-directed, or you can provide scheduled programming to encourage families to walk along with a librarian who will read the story.
- Ask your local DNR office if they could arrange for a visit with Smokey Bear.
- If your community has an Astronomy Club, invite them to present a program at the library or host a star-watching party. The continental United States will see two eclipses in the coming year: an annular solar eclipse on October 14, 2023, and a total solar eclipse on April 8, 2024. Wisconsin is not in the path of totality for either event, but with proper viewing/safety equipment, we could view a partial eclipse. This is a great opportunity for outdoor programming!

Storytime Resources

Program themes

- Family Camp Out: <u>Marge Loch-Waters</u> shared a great idea for an evening event that combines a short storytime with time for families to build their own forts in the library. Incorporate outdoor recreation themed books and use the event as an opportunity to promote your park passes.
- Storytime Camping: Create a make-believe fire and share stories and sing camp songs.
- **Hold StoryTime outdoors:** Consider partnering with a local park, DNR property, or nature center to hold a library event in a new location. Be sure to have a backup plan in case of bad weather.
- <u>Feathered Friends</u> from The Cornell Lab of Ornithology contains monthly lessons in bird watching and identification. The lessons include games and hands-on activities that could be adapted for library programming.

Activities and crafts

- Check out the <u>Wisconsin Explorer Program</u> from Wisconsin State Parks for workbooks and activities, and download <u>Nature Discovery Kits</u> for science lessons, crafts, and activities.
- Make <u>natural paintbrushes</u> with conifer needles and sticks and use them to paint pictures and experiment with different textures.
- Create <u>bird seed cookies</u> with seed and gelatin or recycled hanging bird feeders with old plastic containers. Read stories about birds and talk about birdwatching and the birds that live in your area.
- Make binoculars out of toilet tissue cardboard rolls. <u>Follow these instructions from PBS Kids</u> for a
 fancier set of play binoculars for older children, or simply glue two rolls together, punch holes to add
 a yarn strap, and allow younger children to decorate their binoculars with markers or stickers.
- Serve S'Mores Mix at your camping-themed storytime: Mix Golden Grahams cereal or Teddy
 Grahams, mini marshmallows, and chocolate chips and share in small paper cups. You can try other
 kinds of trail mix, too, but omit the peanuts to avoid allergy issues.
- Make paper S'Mores: Provide young children with a large square of tan
 construction paper. Cut out a rectangle of darker brown paper or cardstock for
 the chocolate bar, and glue it to the tan construction paper graham cracker.
 Glue cotton balls on top of the chocolate bar to look like marshmallows.
- **Popsicle stick tent craft**: Use three popsicle sticks, some paper, and glue to create a <u>cute tent craft activity</u>, as shared by Glued To My Crafts.
- Be Outside from Idaho libraries shared 60 program ideas for outdoor and nature programs.
