Private Schools in Wisconsin

To be a private school in Wisconsin, a school must meet the criteria in Wis. Stat. s. 118.165(1).

- provide private or religious-based education
- be privately controlled
- provide at least 875 hours of instruction each school year
- provide a sequentially progressive curriculum of fundamental instruction in reading, language arts, mathematics, social studies, science and health
- not be operated or instituted for the purpose of avoiding or circumventing the compulsory school attendance requirement under s. <u>118.15 (1) (a)</u> and <u>(am)</u>
- have pupils return annually to the homes of their parents or guardians for not less than 2
 months of summer vacation, or the institution is licensed as a child welfare agency under s.
 48.60 (1).

To be a private school in the state of Wisconsin, a school must meet the criteria in <u>Wis. Stat. s. 118.165(1)</u>. This criteria includes the items below.

- provide private or religious-based education
- be privately controlled
- provide at least 875 hours of instruction each school year
- provide a sequentially progressive curriculum of fundamental instruction in reading, language arts, mathematics, social studies, science and health
- not be operated or instituted for the purpose of avoiding or circumventing the compulsory school attendance requirement under s. <u>118.15 (1) (a)</u> and

Milwaukee Parental Choice Program (MPCP)

 Students must be residents of the City of Milwaukee to be eligible for the MPCP.

Racine Parental Choice Program (RPCP)

Students must reside in the Racine Unified School
 District to be eligible for the RPCP.

Students must reside in the Racine Unified School District to be eligible for the Racine Parental Choice Program.

Wisconsin Parental Choice Program (WPCP)

- Students must reside in the State of Wisconsin but not in the City of Milwaukee or in the Racine Unified School District to be eligible for the WPCP.
- In the 2025-26 school year, enrollment in WPCP is limited by state law to the school district's participation limit for the 2025-26 school year.

Students must reside in the State of Wisconsin but not in the City of Milwaukee or in the Racine Unified School District to be eligible for the Wisconsin Parental Choice Program. In the 2025-26 school year, enrollment in WPCP is limited by state law to the school district's participation limit for the 2025-26 school year.

"New Private School"

- There are additional requirements for schools considered to be "new private schools."
- Wis. Stat. s. <u>119.23(1)(ai)1</u> and <u>118.60(1)(bn)1</u> notes that, except as provided in subd. 2., "new private school" means a school that qualifies as a private school under s. <u>115.001 (3r)</u> and that satisfies either of the following:
 - The school has been in continuous operation in this state for **less than** 12 consecutive months.
 - The school provides education to fewer than 40 pupils divided into 2 or fewer grades.

There are additional requirements for schools considered to be "new private schools."

Wis. Stat. s. <u>119.23(1)(ai)1</u>. and <u>118.60(1)(bn)1</u> notes that, except as provided in subd. 2., "new private school" means a school that qualifies as a private school under s. <u>115.001 (3r)</u> and that satisfies either of the following:

- The school has been in continuous operation in this state for less than 12 consecutive months.
- The school provides education to fewer than 40 pupils divided into 2 or fewer grades.

"New Private School"

- Under Wis. Stat. s. <u>119.23(1)(ai)2</u>. and <u>118.60(1)(bn)2</u>., a school is not considered
 a new private school if it is operated/managed by a governing body which
 operates/manages a private school that is already participating in the Choice
 programs if:
 - No payment has been withheld from any private school operated or managed by the governing body in the 3 immediately preceding school years.
 AND
 - No order, barring any private school operator managed by the governing body from participating in the program under this section has been issued in three immediately preceding school years.

Under Wis. Stat. s. <u>119.23(1)(ai)2</u>. and <u>118.60(1)(bn)2</u>., a school is not considered a new private school if it is operated or managed by a governing body which operates or manages a private school that is already participating in the Choice programs if:

 No payment has been withheld from any private school operated or managed by the governing body in the 3 immediately preceding school years.

AND

 No order, barring any private school operator managed by the governing body from participating in the program under this section has been issued in three immediately preceding school years.

A summary of some of the initial requirements for new private schools that want to participate in the Choice programs 2025-2026 school year, are as follows.

- First, a notice of intent to participate due August 1st,
 2024, which is an electronic document that needs to be submitted.
- An auditor fee of \$275 and the form are due August 1st, 2024. It is either an electronic payment or mailed. The fee may be in the form of the cashier's check or pay it online. If paying with the cashier's check, auditor fee paper form must accompany the check. DPI strongly encourages that schools use the Online Payment Form.

- The Disclosure of information form and attachments are due August 1st, 2024. This is submitted via email and requires signatures from board members.
- The Budget and Cash Flow Report and the required attachments are due August 1st, 2024. The later trainings will describe the Budget & Cash Flow Report in detail. The report and all required attachments must be uploaded to Kiteworks.
- A copy of the school's <u>academic standards</u> (not curriculum) required under Wis. Stat. §§ 118.60(6p)(b) and 119.23 (6p)(b).
- Pre accreditation is due December 15th, 2024. It is an emailed letter from the organization confirming that the school is pre accredited.

August 1, 2024 Deadline

By August 1, "New private schools" must provide DPI with:

- A Notice of Intent to Participate and agreement to comply with procedural requirements including the mailing address
 of the school. If the school does not already have a location, the Notice of Intent to Participate must identify the
 address as TBD.
- A complete Budget & Cash Flow Report and related attachments that meet the requirements described in later trainings.
- The nonrefundable fee of \$275 in the form of a cashier's check or paid online.
- Provide information related to the school's policies and governing board (including addresses and signatures of all board members); also known as the Disclosures of Information.
- A copy of the school's <u>academic standards</u> (not curriculum) required under Wis. Stat. §§ 118.60(6p)(b) and 119.23
 (6p)(b).

By August 1, "New private schools" must provide DPI with:

- A Notice of Intent to Participate and agreement to comply with procedural requirements including the mailing address of the school. If the school does not already have a location, the Notice of Intent to Participate must identify the address as TBD.
- A complete Budget & Cash Flow Report and related attachments that meet the requirements described in later trainings.

The nonrefundable fee of \$275 in the form of a cashier's check or paid online.

December Deadlines

- New schools intending to participate in the PSCP in the 2025-26 school year must obtain preaccreditation by a preaccrediting entity as defined in Wis. Stat. §§ 118.60(1)(cm) or 119.23(1)(ap) by December 15, 20243.
 By December 15, 2024, the school must ensure the letter from the preaccrediting entity, which indicates the school is preaccredited, is emailed to privateschoolchoice@dpi.wi.gov.
- By December 31, 2024, the DPI must notify whether the "new private school" has satisfied the initial requirements to participate in the Choice program.

New schools intending to participate in the PSCP in the 2025-26 school year must obtain preaccreditation by a preaccrediting entity as defined in Wis. Stat. §§ 118.60(1)(cm) or 119.23(1)(ap) by December 15, 2024. By December 15, 2024, the school must ensure the letter from the preaccrediting entity, which indicates the school is preaccredited, is emailed to privateschoolchoice@dpi.wi.gov.

By December 31, 2024, the DPI must notify whether the "new private school" has satisfied the initial requirements to participate in the Choice program.

Notice of New School's Intent to Participate 2025-26 School Year due to DPI by August 1, 2024

- · Electronic form will be posted to DPI's website.
- Follow the directions on the form. Complete the form in its entirety.
- Required Information on the form includes:
 - School Information (including mailing address).
 - Choice Administrator's name, degree information or DPI license and contact information
- Choice administrator must provide electronic signature.
- Form must be submitted electronically. Form includes certification by the Choice administrator that he/she agrees to comply with program requirements.
- Print or save a digital copy for your records.

There are no exceptions to the August 1 due date.

The school must fill out a notice of the school's intent to participate by August 1st of 2024. The electronic form will be posted to DPI's website. Follow the directions on the form and complete the form in its entirety. Required information on the form includes school information, including the school's mailing address, choice administrators name, degree information, or DPI license and contact information.

Choice administrator must provide an electronic signature.

The form must be submitted electronically. The form includes certification by the choice administrator that he or she agrees to comply with program requirements.

You may print or save a digital copy for your records. There are no exceptions to this August 1st due date.

Disqualified Person

- A disqualified person may not be an owner, officer, director, trustee, administrator, administrator's designee or a
 person responsible for administrative, financial or pupil health and safety matters, whether compensated or not, at a
 Choice school participating in the program or programs the person is disqualified from.
- A "Disqualified person" is a person who, when a private school was barred or terminated from participation in a Choice program, either:
 - 119.23(1)(ag)1or 118.60(1)(ag)1 Had a controlling ownership interest in, or was the administrator or an officer, director, or trustee of, the private school.
 - <u>119.23(1)(ag)2 or 118.60(1)(ag)2</u> Was a person designated by the administrator of the private school to assist in processing pupil applications.
 - 119.23(1)(ag)3 or 118.60(1)(ag)3 Was responsible for an action or circumstance that led to the private school being barred or terminated from participation in the program under this section.
 - Disqualified persons are listed on our web page at: https://dpi.wi.gov/parental-education-options/choice-programs/school-information

A disqualified person may not be an owner, officer, director, trustee, administrator, administrator's designee or a person responsible for administrative, financial or pupil health and safety matters, whether compensated or not, at a Choice school participating in the program or programs the person is disqualified from.

A "Disqualified person" is a person who, when a private school was barred or terminated from participation in a Choice program, either:

- <u>119.23(1)(ag)1or 118.60(1)(ag)1</u> Had a controlling ownership interest in, or was the administrator or an officer, director, or trustee of, the private school.
- <u>119.23(1)(ag)2 or 118.60(1)(ag)2</u> Was a person

- designated by the administrator of the private school to assist in processing pupil applications.
- 119.23(1)(ag)3 or 118.60(1)(ag)3 Was responsible for an action or circumstance that led to the private school being barred or terminated from participation in the program under this section.

Auditor Fee and Form

- Due August 1, 2024
- \$275 nonrefundable fee
- Amount may be more or less for the 2025-26 school year, depending on a recalculation.
 - If more money is due, the school will be notified and payment will be due by January 10, 2025.
 - If the fee is less than \$275, the difference will be refunded to you by the DPI.

The auditor fee and form is due August 1st, 2024. It is \$275 and is non-refundable. The amount may be more or less for the 2025-2026 school year depending the Department's later calculation. If more money is due, the school will be notified and the additional payment will be due by January 10th, 2025. If the fee is less than \$275, the difference will be refunded to you by the Department of Public Instruction.



Disclosure of information includes statutorily required school policies and information. The following slides lists the required policies and information that must be submitted as part of the disclosure of information due August 1st.

Required Information – Contact Info

- School name
- Address
- Telephone number of the school
- Name of one or more contact persons at the school
- The list of the members of the school's governing body and of the school's shareholders
 - The list of board members must match the list that is included on the Disclosure of Information form.

Required Information: contact information, school name, address, telephone number, name of one or more contact persons at the school, the list of the members of the school's governing body and or of the school shareholders, the list of board members much match the list that is included in the disclosure of information form.

Required Information – Organization Status

- Statement whether or not the private school is operating as a for profit or not for profit
 - The school must specifically state if the organization is a for or not for profit
- A copy of the school's 501(c)(3) certificate issued by the IRS, if the school is a nonprofit organization
- If the school is a not for profit and does not yet have a 501(c)(3) the school must apply for one through the IRS and check the appropriate box on the Disclosure of Information form.

The school must indicate its organizational status and state if the organization is a for profit or not for profit.

A copy of the school's 501C3 certificate issued by the IRS is required if the school is a nonprofit organization. If the school does not yet have a 501C3, the school must apply for one through the IRS and check the appropriate box on the Disclosure of Information form.

Required Policies – Application Appeals Process

- Schools may only reject a Choice application if the application does not meet program requirements.
- Schools must conduct a random selection for MPCP and RPCP applications, if applicable, prior to the next open application period, within 60 days after the end of the application period, or prior to the next count date, whichever comes first. Therefore, there is a limited time for appeals.
- Schools participating in the WPCP must provide final verification prior to the first weekday in May. Therefore, WPCP schools will need to receive appeals soon after receiving documentation.

Application appeals process: Schools may only reject a choice application if the application does not meet program requirements. Schools must conduct a random selection, if applicable, prior to the next open application period within 60 days after the end of the open application period or prior to the next count date, whichever comes first. Therefore, there is a limited time for appeals.

Schools participating in the Wisconsin Parental Choice program must provide final verification prior to the first weekday in May. Therefore, WPCP schools will need to receive appeals soon after receiving documentation.

Required Policies – High School Diploma

- If your school grants high school diplomas, the criteria must include:
 - The pupil's academic performance
 - · Recommendations of teachers
 - Successful completion of the civics test
- Choice Students may opt out of religious instruction, as such religious courses. These courses cannot be a requirement for graduation or grade promotion. The policy must indicate what courses the student could take in place of required religious instruction.

High school diploma: If your school grants high school diplomas, the criteria must include the pupil's academic performance, recommendations of teachers, and successful completion of the civics test. Choice students may opt out of religious instruction. These courses cannot be a requirement for graduation or grade promotion. The policy must indicate what courses the student could take in place of required religious instruction.

Required Policies – Non-Harassment Policy

- The school's non-harassment policy (not the school's employee non-harassment policy)
- The policy must include:
 - To whom and what format the harassment should be reported, i.e. verbal and/or written
 - Procedures for obtaining relief from harassment, including potential disciplinary actions and who will enforce these actions

The school must submit its non harassment policy. Please note the school should not submit its employee non harassment policy. The policy must include to whom and what format the harassment should be reported i.e. verbal or written, and procedures for obtaining relief from the harassment, including potential disciplinary actions, and who will enforce these actions.

Required Policies – Suspension and Expulsion and Appeal Procedures

- Suspension and expulsion policies and procedures must include:
 - Types of conduct that will result in a suspension or expulsion
 - · Notice provided to parents
- Appeal for a suspension or expulsion must include:
 - Time frame for appeals
 - To whom the appeal should be submitted
 - Format of the appeal: written or verbal
 - When and by whom the decision of the appeal will be made, and how the decision will be communicated to the parent

The school must submit its suspension and expulsion policies.

Suspension and expulsion policies and procedures must include:

- Types of conduct that will result in a suspension or expulsion
- Notice provided to parents

Appeal for a suspension or expulsion must include:

- Time frame for appeals
- To whom the appeal should be submitted
- Format of the appeal: written or verbal
- When and by whom the decision of the appeal will be made, and how the decision will be communicated to

the parent

Required Policies - Transfer of Credits

- Transfer of Credits policy is required of all schools, not just high schools.
- School must explain how it will evaluate coursework and accept or deny the coursework or credits earned at another school.
- Cannot be used to determine whether a student receives a seat or not.

The school must submit its transfer of credits policy. This is required of all schools, not just high schools. A school must explain how it will evaluate coursework and accept or deny the coursework or credits earned at another school. This can't be used to determine whether a student receives a Choice seat or not.

Required Policies - Visitor Policy

- Policy governing visitors to the school:
 - · Check-in procedure, if any
 - · Limits on visitors or time for visiting, if any
 - Identification requirements, if any

The school must submit its visitor policy. This should include its check-in procedure, any limits on visitors or time for visiting, if any, and identification requirements, if any.

Academic Standards

- Due Aug 1, 2024
- Academic standards specify what students should know and be able to do in the classroom. They serve as goals and
 outcomes for teaching and learning. Academic standards are not curriculum, material used in the classroom, or a
 program description. The school must provide the academic standards for grade levels in ALL of the following specific
 subjects to DPI:
 - Mathematics
 - Science
 - Reading and Writing
 - Geography
 - History
- One of the following must be submitted with the Disclosure of Information:
 - A statement that the school has adopted the pupil academic standards issued by the governor as Executive Order No. 326, dated January 13, 1998;
 - A web link for the school's academic standards; or
 - A notice that parents may request academic standards and where they can access the academic standards (i.e., school office, school library, etc.).

A copy of the school's academic standards are due August 1st of 2024.

Academic standards specify what students should know and be able to do in the classroom. They serve as goals and outcomes for teaching and learning. Academic standards are not curriculum, material used in the classroom, or program description. The school must provide the academic standards for grade levels in all the following specific subjects to DPI: mathematics, science, reading and writing, geography, and history.

One of the following must be submitted, possibly with the

disclosure of information:

- a statement that the school has adopted the pupil Academic standards issued by the governor as Executive Order number 326, dated January 13th, 1998;
- A web link for the school's academic standards;OR
- a notice that parents may request academic standards and where they can access the academic standards, i.e. school office, school library, et cetera.

Preaccreditation

"Preaccreditation" means the review and approval of an education plan. Review of an education plan includes consideration of whether the school submitting the plan meets the requirements under s. 118.165(1). The fact that a private school has obtained preaccreditation does not require an accrediting entity to accredit the private school. (Wis. Stats. 119.23(1)(am) and 118.60(1)(c))

Pre accreditation means the review and approval of an education plan. Review of an education plan includes consideration of whether the school submitting the plan meets the requirements under section 118.165 (1). The fact that a private school has obtained pre accreditation does not require an accrediting entity to accredit the private school.

Preaccreditation

- "New schools" must obtain preaccreditation from a preaccrediting entity as defined in Wis. Stat. §§ 118.60(1)(cm) or 119.23(1)(ap).
- Notice from preaccrediting entity must be forwarded to DPI no later than December 15, 2024.

New schools must obtain pre accreditation from a pre accrediting entity as defined in Wis. Stat. §§ 118.60(1)(cm) or 119.23(1)(ap) . Notice from pre accrediting entity must be forwarded to the DPI no later than December 15th 2024. The school is responsible for ensuring that this is submitted to DPI.

PI 1207 Report

- Every private school in Wisconsin annually submits to the DPI a PI-1207 report, due by October 15.
- School will attest to its compliance with Wis. Stats. 118.165(1) and report its enrollment as of the third Friday in September.

Every private school in Wisconsin annually submits to the DPI a <u>PI-1207</u> report, due by October 15. School will attest to its compliance with Wis. Stats. 118.165(1) and report its enrollment as of the third Friday in September. Schools that submit a PI -1207 will have their information posted in the Private School Directory.

General Requirements

Some general requirements for private schools participating in the choice program are health and safety, CPR and health Instruction, IEQ, tuition and fees, religious activities, staff credentials, testing, student information systems, hours of instruction, standards and promotion policies, Act 20, and required meetings,

Health and Safety Requirements

- Schools must comply with all health and safety laws and codes that apply to public schools.
 - Wis. Stat. 119.23(2)(a)5 and 118.60(2)(a)5
- Schools must also:
 - Meet program insurance coverage requirements. See the insurance and
 Fidelity Bond Bulletin on the Choice Program website for more information.

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Certificate of Occupancy

- Choice schools must provide, for all buildings if the school is participating in the MPCP and for any buildings located in the Racine Unified School District for WPCP and RPCP schools:
 - A certificate of occupancy from the municipality within which the private school is located; or
 - A certificate of occupancy from a local or regional unit who has the authority to issue certificates of occupancy; or
 - iii. If the municipality and/or regional unit does not issue certificates of occupancy, then submit a letter from the municipality within which the school is located explaining that the municipality does not issue certificates of occupancy.

Choice schools must provide, for all buildings if the school is participating in the MPCP and for any buildings located in the Racine Unified School District for WPCP and RPCP schools:

- i. A certificate of occupancy from the municipality within which the private school is located; or
- ii. A certificate of occupancy from a local or regional unit who has the authority to issue certificates of occupancy; or
- iii. If the municipality and/or regional unit does not issue certificates of occupancy, then submit a letter from the municipality within which the school is located explaining that the municipality does not issue certificates of occupancy.

CPR Requirement

- Wis. Stat.§ <u>118.076(3)</u> requires private schools offering any grade from 7 to 12 to:
 - Offer CPR instruction; and
 - Provide instruction about defibrillators.

Health Instruction

- Provide instruction in cardiopulmonary resuscitation and cardiocerebral resuscitation and incorporate the psychomotor skills necessary to perform resuscitation, in any health course, grades 7-12.
- Instructional program developed by the American Red Cross or the American Heart Association; or nationally recognized evidence-based guidelines.
- Provide instruction about automated external defibrillators to pupils grades 7-12.

Health instruction: provide instructions in cardiopulmonary resuscitation and cardiorcerebral resuscitation, and incorporate the psychomotor skills necessary to perform resuscitation, in any health course grades seven through 12. Instructional program developed by the American Red Cross or the American Heart Association or nationally recognized evidence-based guidelines are required. The school must provide instruction about automated external defibrillators to pupils grades seven through 12.

Indoor Environmental Quality Plan (IEQ)

- Wis. Stats.§§ 119.23(7)(g) and 118.60(7)(g) requires Choice schools to provide for the development of a plan for maintaining IEQ in the private school by October 1 of the first school year the school participates in the Choice program and implementation of the plan by the beginning of the second school year the school participates in the Choice program.

Wis. Stats.§§ 119.23(7)(g) and 118.60(7)(g) requires Choice schools to provide for the development of a plan for maintaining IEQ in the private school by October 1 of the *first school year the school participates* in the Choice program and implementation of the plan by the beginning of the *second school year the school participates* in the Choice program.

Tuition

- A private school participating in the program may charge or receive additional <u>tuition</u> payments for a pupil participating in the Choice programs if:
 - The student is in grades 9-12, AND
 - The student's family income is <u>more</u> than 220% of the federal poverty level.
- Choice students in grades K-8 may not be charged tuition.

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- The student's family income is <u>more</u> than 220% of the federal poverty level.

Choice students in grades K-8 may not be charged tuition.

Fees

- A school may charge Choice students, regardless of their income, fees to recover the cost of the following items:
 - Personal use items, such as uniforms, gym clothes, and towels
 - Social and extracurricular activities if not necessary to the private school's curriculum
 - Musical instruments
 - Meals consumed by pupils of the private school
 - High school classes that are not required for graduation and for which no credits toward graduation are given
 - Transportation
 - Before-school and after-school childcare
 - Room and board at the private school

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Religious Activities

Choice parents may opt the student out of religious
 activities, including religious instruction. Many schools
 may have religious instruction as part of their
 requirements for grade promotion or graduating from high
 school. The school's policy must indicate what courses
 would replace any religious instruction if a parent opts his
 or her student out of religious activities.

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Staff Credentials

- All administrators must have at least a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution of higher education or a teaching license or administrator's license issued by the DPI.
 - To verify whether an institution is accredited, check the U.S. Dept of Education database at http://ope.ed.gov/accreditation/
- All teachers must have at least a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution of higher education or a teaching license issued by the DPI.
- All teacher aides must have at least graduated from high school or been granted a GED or HSED, or have been granted a high school diploma by the administrator of a home-based private education program.

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Criminal Background Checks

- Background checks must be conducted for all individuals defined as employees under
 Wis. Stat. § 108.02 (12) who are directly or indirectly related to the school's educational
 programming. Individuals who perform services for a school may be considered
 employees regardless of whether the individuals are paid directly by the school.
- In order to determine which individuals require a background check, the school should begin by generating a list of all individuals who perform services for their legal entity. The school must conduct a background check for any individual on the list who is an employee of the legal entity and directly or indirectly related to the school's educational programming.

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Student Testing

- · All schools must annually administer the required state assessments.
 - The assessment requirement is waived for any school that participates in one of the Choice programs if the school has fewer than 20 students in grades 3-12.
- A school may administer additional tests.

Student Information System

- 2013 Wisconsin Act 256 requires private schools participating in Choice programs to have a commercially-available student information system (SIS) capable of exchanging data (interoperating) with the state data system.
- Schools must submit secure, student-level assessment, attendance, graduation and demographic data.
- SIS systems with the ability to exchange data with DPI can be found on the WISEdata website.

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Hours of Instruction

- Schools in the Choice program must annually provide at least
 1,050 hours of direct pupil instruction to grades 1-6 and at least
 1,137 hours of direct pupil instruction to grades 7-12.
- Hours include recess and transfer time but do not include the lunch periods.
- See Training 3-1 on the <u>Choice Programs: On Demand Training</u> webpage.

Schools in the Choice program must annually provide at least 1050 hours of direct pupil instruction to grades one through 6 and at least 1137 hours of direct pupil instruction to grades 7 through 12. Kindergarten hours should match that of first grade. 437 hours must be provided for K4. Hours include recess and transfer time, but do not include lunch periods.

Promotion Policies

- The governing body of each school must adopt a written policy specifying criteria for:
 - · Granting a high school diploma;
 - Promoting a student from 4th to 5th grade; and
 - Promoting a student from 8th to 9th grade.

The governing body of each school must adopt a written policy specifying criteria for granting a high school diploma, promoting a student from 4th to 5th grade, and promoting a student from 8th to 9th grade.

Act 20 Requirements

- Choice schools may not purchase curricula or instructional materials that include three-cueing or MSV. Beginning in the 2024 25 school year, schools participating in the Choice programs are prohibited from providing early literacy instruction in grades
 4K through 3 that include the instructional model known as three-cueing. Find further clarification of this requirement above.
- By July 1, 2025, schools participating in the Choice programs are required to implement a policy for promoting students from 3rd to 4th grade that includes performance on the English Language Arts assessment, which includes reading (see bullet below), required reading interventions for all tested students not at grade level in third grade and promoted (see Wis. Stat. s. 118.33(5m)(a) 1. for additional information about interventions), and a "good cause exception" similar to the exceptions listed in Wis. Stat. s. 118.33(5m)(b). Beginning on September 1, 2027, a Choice school may not promote a 3rd grade pupil to the 4th grade unless the pupil satisfies the criteria for promotion specified in the policy.
- As a reminder, the English Language Arts assessment must be administered to Choice students and to non-choice students when a Choice school opts in to an All Students Report Card.
- In addition to the requirements, Act 20 provides for some supports to schools that Choice schools are eligible for. Choice
 schools will be eligible to apply for the partial curriculum reimbursement grants if they adopt an early literacy curriculum from
 the recommended list (found on DPI's <u>Wisconsin Reads</u> site), and at least two Choice schools will receive a statewide early
 literacy coach.

Required Meetings

Schools are required to:

- Annually schedule two meetings at which the governing body will be present and parents and students can attend.
- Notify parents in writing at least 30 days prior to the meetings of the dates, times, and places.

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Additional Requirements

- · Schools are required to:
 - Comply with federal provisions prohibiting discrimination based on race, color or national origin.
 - Complete and file the required forms on a timely basis.

Schools are required to comply with federal provisions prohibiting discrimination based on race, color or national origin.

They must also complete and file the required forms on a timely basis.

Additional Information

- A training will be offered in the Fall of 2024 (not required).
- Additional new school registration materials required by January 10, 2025.
- Must meet all financial reporting requirements of the Choice program auditors.
