




### Evidence/Root Causes 2013-2017

#### Root cause:

- ➤ Leadership turnover (principal, student services)
- ➤ Change in philosophy, expectations and support resulting from leadership change
- > Special education pull-out class students did not have access to grade level curriculum standards
- > Lack of a universal Literature/ Language curriculum
- ➤ Little collaboration between regular education and special education teachers

### **School Strategic Goal:**


Students with disabilities in Milton Middle School will match or exceed the state average for students with disabilities on the 2015 Smarter Balanced reading assessment.

- Collect additional reading data on all students (reading iep goals)

Scaling up math co-teaching


Promote efficacy of staff - Strengthen skills of special education teachers in order to strengthen all staff skills







## Paints of Price

Our Closing the Gap efforts have improved 13% moving from below the state average to above.

#### The bulk of the movement is seen in Reading

Multiple factors including implementing co-teaching in both 7th and 8th grade Literature and Language blocks boosting reading 34%.

## Paints of Pride

Our **Student Growth** scores have improved **10%**, although we are still hovering below the state average.
