Opioid Prevention Grant Program

- The grant aims to support new or existing substance use prevention programs that are supplemented with knowledge and skills specific to opioid prevention and unintentional fentanyl exposure.
- The program provides an opportunity for Wisconsin schools to address the misuse of prescription opioids among students and promote a culture of prevention.

Eligibility/Timelines

Eligible Applicants	 Public school districts, private schools, and independent (2r and 2x) charter schools are eligible to apply.
Submission Deadline	 4:00 p.m. on Friday, May 5, 2023 (Qualtrics survey application including signatures, must be received by due date
Budget Timeline	 1-year funding cycle for 2023-2024
Grant funding notifications	 Announced in the summer of 2023 (August).

Funding Priorities

- Substance use prevention policy;
- Evidence-based substance use prevention curriculum/program;
- Inclusion of strategies that build knowledge and skills specific to opioid prevention and unintentional fentanyl exposure; and
- Statewide geographic distribution.

Where Do I Start?

- Read the application and guidance document in their entirety.
- Develop an understanding of the rubric and rating scale.
- Bring together a broad/diverse group of people, including the target population, to develop the grant.
- Begin assessing and analyzing local data to determine need.
- Select evidence-based programs or promising practices to address identified needs.

Opioid Prevention Grant Overview

An AODA Program under Chapter PI-38 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code may include the following action areas:

- Policy
- Curriculum and Instruction
- Student programs
- Adult programs
- Integration of community resources/support
- AODA program coordinator
- Monitoring, assessment and evaluation of AODA program activities
- Comprehensive school health programs

1. Demonstration of Need

The major factors/issues that generated the idea for this application are clearly outlined:

- Uses local data to support the need for opioid grant funding.
- Identifies needs and gaps to be addressed that are directly connected to opioid prevention program development or program expansion.

2. Current Program Status

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Provide a clear and comprehensive assessment of current resources that are present in the school community that support substance use and opioid prevention activities.

3. Proposed Program and Integration

- Opioid prevention strategies are nested within an evidence-based substance use curriculum or program.
- Opioid prevention activities are clearly described and logically lead to an impact on opioid use.
- Proposal addresses policy development.

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- Ideally, activities in the proposal are ongoing. not just a one-time approach.
- Activities have a positive educational value.

Research-Based Programs (Recommended)

What are they?

- Effective, well-implemented school, family, and community programs.
- Providing quality materials, training, and technical assistance.
- Reviewed according to rigorous standards of research.

Promising Practices (Another Good Option)

What are they?

- Effective school, community, and family-focused *strategies* for altering individual choices toward drug abuse.
- Research-based prevention *strategies* that have positive outcome results in reducing risk factors or increasing protective factors for drug use or actual drug use initiation and use.

4. Measure of Success

- Measures are reasonable for addressing the prevention and reduction of opioid use.
- Includes not only process measures (number served, etc.) but also identifies outcome measures (changes in attitudes, behaviors, knowledge, skills).
- Identifies the number of students benefiting from the program.

5. One Year Budget/Plan

- Costs and purpose should be clearly described and itemized. They should also be reasonable and appropriate.
- Funds can <u>supplement</u> new or additional costs. They cannot <u>supplant</u> current funds.
- Staff stipends/salaries are limited to 20 percent of the total grant budget.
- The \$1,000 per day limit on consultants/speakers/trainers, not including expenses.
- Treatment; Naloxone; entertainment; furniture; capital objects; technology and indirect costs are not allowed.
- Application budget should be for July 1, 2023-June 30, 2024.
- A match amount is not required for this grant.
