## **Best Practices in the Preparation Program**

- Share with the preparation program director that a Tier 1 license is being or has been obtained.
- Seek advisement with preparation program director to develop a scope and sequence of coursework based on the emerging professional's training, experience, and immediate needs.
- Prioritize content knowledge and skill acquisition needed to support critical and high stakes needs in school, such as: suicide prevention, intervention and postvention; educational laws and policies; child abuse and mandated reporting; counseling skills; cultural responsiveness; trauma sensitive practices; and child development.
- Utilize office hours and consultation regularly with school counseling licensed faculty to discuss practice, specific situations, and ethical dilemmas.

## **Best Practices in the Employment Setting**

- Acquire knowledge and understanding and engage with the American School Counselor Association (ASCA) <u>Ethical Standards</u> and laws applicable to school counseling roles and responsibilities.
- Learn and implement best practice models, including Wisconsin's adopted ASCA National Model and ASCA Position Statements.
- Understand the similarities and differences between clinical counseling practice and school counseling practice, including roles and responsibilities.
- Practice with an awareness of liability and limitations related to emerging skills and current competence.
- Assess with supervisor consultation, current competency based on education, training, and professional experience to determine role responsibility and scope of practice.
- Learn and follow local school board policies and the <u>ASCA School Counselor Professional Standards</u> and <u>Competencies</u>.
- Use the <u>educator evaluation process</u> to enhance support and feedback, including the <u>school</u> <u>counselor specific evaluation rubric</u>.
- Design a personalized professional development plan based on the school counseling role and the emerging professional's specific training needs.
- Hold regular meetings with a supervisor competent and licensed in school counseling to discuss practice, specific situations, and ethical dilemmas.
- Consult with professional colleagues supervisors, graduate school faculty and advisors, school counseling colleagues, student service professionals, state and national associations, and cultural experts.
