### <u>Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) Related to the Definitions, Roles, and Responsibilities of Parents, Persons Acting as the Parent of a Child, and Surrogate Parents</u>

Over the years, the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) and the Department of Children and Families (DCF) have frequently received questions relating to the definitions of "parent," "person acting as the parent of a child," and "surrogate parent." Those definitions are of particular importance when it comes to children under the guardianship of DCF and children with disabilities. This document tries to address the questions which have been most frequently asked.

#### IDEA 2004: Procedural Safeguards Notice

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), the Federal law concerning the education of students with disabilities, requires schools to provide parents of a child with a disability with a notice containing a full explanation of the procedural safeguards available under the IDEA and U.S. Department of Education regulations. A copy of this notice must be given to parents only one time a school year, except that a copy must be given to the parents:

- 1. upon initial referral or parent request for evaluation;
- 2. upon receipt of the first State complaint under 34 CFR §§300.151 through 300.153 and upon receipt of the first due process complaint under §300.507 in a school year;
- 3. when a decision is made to take a disciplinary action that constitutes a change of placement; and
- 4. upon parent request. [34 CFR §300.504(a)]

#### Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973

DPI doesn't monitor or adjudicate complaints, the Office of Civil Rights at the US Department of Education has that responsibility.
