What are the benefits?

- Obtaining Teacher Certification in Mathematics, Science or Special Education
- Tuition Assistance
- \$5,000 Incentive with a three-year teaching commitment

Who is eligible? Candidates must:

- Have a passion to teach
- Have a bachelors degree, but not a teaching license
- Meet WI SMARTT-Transition to Teaching Grant criteria
- Pass Praxis I Exam (Reading, Writing, Mathematics)
- Pass Praxis II Exam

What are the Conditions of the Grant?

- Must be prepared for Mathematics, Science, or Special Education licensure
- Must be willing to teach at one of the partnering school districts identified in this program
- Must make a 3-year teaching commitment after preparation to a partnering school district
- Must be prepared at a partnering alternative route program

What is the SMARTT Project?

The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) received a \$2.2 million, five-year grant from the U.S. Department of Education to train 100 mathematics, science and special education teachers through alternative route certification programs. The Support for Mid-Career Advancement and Retention through Transition-to-Teaching (SMARTT) Project targets mid-career professionals, paraprofessionals, recent college graduates, and honorably discharged military personnel. Individuals must already have a bachelor's degree, but not a teaching license.

Participants in the SMARTT project will obtain subject-area certification or teacher certification through existing state-approved alternative route educator preparation programs. Mentoring and support activities will be provided for the three years that candidates commit to teaching in one of the participating school districts.
