Title I Schoolwide Program

There are two types of Title I programs: targeted assistance and schoolwide. A schoolwide program is a comprehensive reform strategy designed to upgrade the entire educational program in a Title I schools must apply to become a schoolwide program.

The school's schoolwide plan must be in an understandable format. The schoolwide plan must be easily accessible and available to school and district staff, parents, and the public. Essential Components of a Schoolwide Program Include:



Serving all Students, Families, Staff In a schoolwide program, all students, staff, and families are Title I contributors.



Student Progress Monitoring The plan may include tools and processes for ongoing student progress monitoring. Schoolwide programs must have methods for reporting student progress to parents.



Addressing the Schoolwide Plan The school's schoolwide plan must be in an understandable format. The schoolwide plan must be easily accessible and available to school and district staff, parents, and the public. The school must regularly review the plan and revise as necessary with their schoolwide team.



School Team A school must have a team, including teachers, principals, other school leaders, paraprofessionals, parents, and other members of the community to implement the schoolwide plan.



Parent and Family Engagement A schoolwide program must involve parents in an organized, ongoing, and timely manner in the planning, review, and improvement of the schoolwide program. The process should include an adequate representation of the families served by the school.
